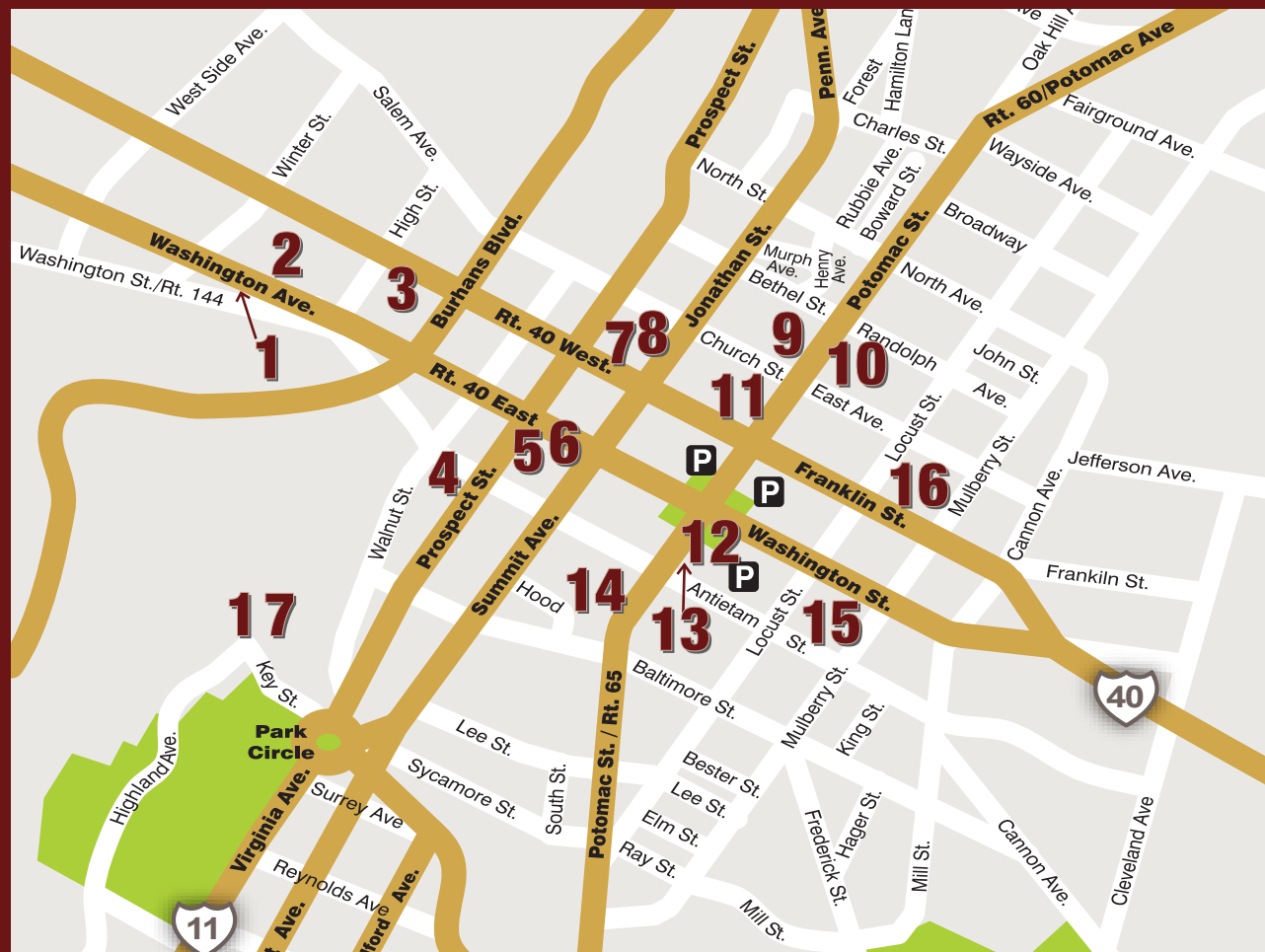

2015 HISTORIC HOUSES OF WORSHIP TOUR

1 SAINT MARKS LUTHERAN CHURCH

601 Washington Avenue

Founded in 1889 in the Western Enterprise Fire House on Washington Square, the church later moved onto the square with the first church building which was replaced with the present 1929 Gothic Revival sanctuary. Features include a three manual Moller organ, depiction of Christ ascending on the altar wall, German paint decorations and pristine wood work. Organ and piano Christmas music throughout the tour.



2 WASHINGTON SQUARE UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

538 Washington Avenue

Washington Square was a mission church started under St. Paul's Methodist Episcopal Church – the people met in an orchard beginning in 1885. A small chapel was built in 1886. In 1888 the land was purchased and a wood-frame church was built. The church building was dedicated in 1889.



3 First Baptist Church

15 High Street

First Baptist Church is the only church in Washington County that has had two presidents attend a worship service. President Lyndon B. Johnson & President Jimmy Carter. Our church belongs to the Southern Baptist Convention.



4 ST. JOHN'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH

101 S. Prospect Street

Neo-gothic in style, St. John's was built in 1872. Notable features include a high Gothic altar, the reredos, a wrought iron rood screen separating the sanctuary from the congregation and beautiful stained glass windows, one of which is a Tiffany. Vocal, piano and organ holiday music will be provided. Church houses a 60 rank Moeller organ.



5 THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF HAGERSTOWN

20 S. Prospect Street

Founded in 1817 on S. Potomac Street, the church moved in 1872 to Prospect Hill, a property donated by the Loose family. Originally constructed in the traditional center-pulpit-and-table style, the sanctuary was renovated in 1949 into a split pulpit with raised communion table, which is the configuration still used today.



6 THE MILLER HOUSE

135 W. Washington Street

REFRESHMENTS SERVED HERE Built in 1825 and presented with period decor and furnishings, the house exhibits collections of pottery, silver, clocks, dolls and toys and Civil War and War of 1812 memorabilia. Special holiday decorations created by county garden clubs enhance the current exhibits.



7 CHRIST'S REFORMED CHURCH

130 W. Franklin Street

Christ's Reformed Church is an old historic German Reformed church, formed in 1854. Notable architectural elements include the crown on the spire, the Rose Medallion window fronting Franklin Street and the reredos behind the altar with its representation of each of the 12 disciples. There will be seasonal music offered each hour on the hour.



8 ASBURY UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

155 Jonathan Street

Founded under the supervision of St. Paul's United Methodist Church in 1818, the Asbury Congregation is the oldest African American church in Hagerstown. The Asbury Methodist Episcopal Church congregation built their first church on the present site in 1864. The church, rebuilt in 1879, was gutted by fire in 1973. This church bears a strong resemblance to the Ebenezer African Methodist Church's 1840 building.



9 ZION REFORMED UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST

201 N. Potomac Street

The Church first gathered in 1766, and Zion was founded in 1770. During the Civil War, the bell tower was used as a sniper post by Gen. Custer. The cemetery bears the remains of veterans from the Revolutionary War, French and Indian War, War of 1812, and our city's founder, Jonathan Hager. It has beautiful Tiffany stained glass windows throughout. It is the oldest church building in Washington County. Moller Organ music and refreshments.



10 TRINITY LUTHERAN CHURCH

N. Potomac Street & Randolph Avenue

Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church, organized in 1859, is a historic setting with a wide variety of ministries including Worship (both Praise and Traditional), Community Outreach, Christian Education and Fine Arts. The cornerstone was laid in 1909, marking the beginning of her ministry to the people of Hagerstown, dedicated to sharing mission and ministry with all God's children in the name of Jesus Christ.



11 JOHN WESLEY UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

129 N. Potomac Street

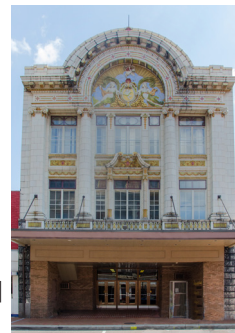
Construction of this historic sanctuary, seating 540, was completed in 1885 at a cost of around \$50,000. Note the beautiful stained and painted glass side windows and the large Rose Window to the rear. A three manual, 43 rank Moller pipe organ is located behind the pulpit. If you look through the screen behind the cross you can see some of its 2,512 pipes.



12 BRIDGE OF LIFE CHURCH

14 S. Potomac Street

Bridge of Life is housed in a 1914-15 structure that was originally the Colonial Theater. The facade is representative of the Baroque style of theater architecture popular in the early twentieth century. Bridge of Life has extensively remodeled the interior of the building. Local artists will have their work on display in the lobby.



13 WASHINGTON COUNTY ARTS COUNCIL

34 S. Potomac Street (entry off Artists Alley)

LIGHT REFRESHMENTS SERVED One of Maryland's 24 art councils, the WCAC has been a partner in the Hagerstown Washington County community since it was formed in 1967. The Exhibit Galleries and The Gallery Shop feature works of local artists. December will showcase the "Annual Community Art Show: The Best Local Art of 2015" juried by R. Benjamin Jones and Benita Keller.



14 SAINT JOHN'S EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH

141 S. Potomac Street

Founded in 1770, St. John's is the oldest Lutheran Church in Hagerstown. The church is noted for its soaring 134 foot steeple used for reconnaissance during the Civil War, its three Tiffany stained glass windows, and a restored 1931 four manual Moller organ. Plenty of parking available. Music on the Moller organ will be played throughout the tour.



15 HAGERSTOWN CHURCH OF THE BRETHREN

15 S. Mulberry Street

The German Baptist Brethren Church of Hagerstown was first recognized as a congregation in 1894. The congregation outgrew the chapel and on July 17, 1897 a new brick church on the corner of E. Washington and Mulberry Street was dedicated and known as The Church of the Brethren.



16 OTTERBEIN UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

108 E. Franklin Street

Otterbein was founded in 1790 as St. Paul's United Brethren in Christ Church and originally met in a building on West Washington Street. Note the reredos and stained glass windows. The current pipe organ is a Moller, installed in 1969 to replace the original 1898 organ, also a Moller, and was recently digitally enhanced. Music and light refreshments provided during the tour.



17 Jonathan Hager House

110 Key Street, Hagerstown City Park

Hagerstown's founder, Jonathan Hager, made his first land buy at this site in 1739. Moravian missionaries from Bethlehem, PA recorded in their journals "delivering sermons in German and English" from the home on three separate occasions. By 1774 Hager donated Potomac Street land plots for establishment of two different churches in town: at one of these he suffered fatal injuries in an accident while superintending the construction of the edifice in 1775.
