


ANTIETAM NATIONAL BATTLEFIELD

Antietam is the site of the bloodiest single-day battle in American history. The fighting in this September 17, 1862, Civil War battle resulted in 23,110 casualties. The National Park Service has designed an 8 ½ mile self-guided driving tour through the park that is perfect for cyclists. Touring the park by bicycle gives a new appreciation for the rolling terrain and how it affected the battle. For more information about the park call 301-432-5124 or visit www.nps.gov/ancm.

CHESAPEAKE AND OHIO CANAL

The C&O Canal National Historical Park winds 184 miles along the Potomac River from Washington, DC, to Cumberland Maryland. Seventynine miles of the Canal pass through Washington County.



The canal towpath is an elevated trail made of earth and crushed stone, used by mules pulling the barges. Though the old canal is overgrown in many places, the towpath itself is clear, and offers an ideal route for bicycles. HISTORY

The first European settlers came to the valley around 1730, attracted by its abundant resources. In the ensuing years, more settlers moved to the area, traveling down the "Valley Road" from Pennsylvania or across South Mountain from Baltimore.

After the French and Indian War, iron forges were established, mills were built, and farming increased as more of the forest was cleared. In 1776, soon

after Maryland became a state, Washington County was established. It was named after George Washington, Commander in Chief of the new continental army.

FORT FREDERICK STATE PARK

This stone fort provides a glimpse of the dangers and hardships faced by the early settlers. Named in honor of Frederick Calvert, the last Lord Baltimore, and garrisoned in 1756, Fort Frederick gave shelter and protection to settlers on the frontier during the French and Indian War. During the Revolution, it was a prison for soldiers captured by the Continental Army. A skirmish was fought at the fort during the Civil War. Now preserved as a state park, it is the site of annual military field days when troops demonstrate authentic drill and ceremony from the colonial period. 


GATHLAND STATE PARK

Gathland State Park was once the mountain home of George Alfred Townsend, a Civil War journalist. It is the site of a unique collection of buildings and structures that he designed and constructed, some of which have been restored. The War Correspondents' Arch is the main attraction at this day use park. The Appalachian Trail traverses the park. The park includes all of Crampton's Gap, which was the southern most gap where troops fought during the Battle of South Mountain. Fought September 14, 1862, it was the first major battle of the Civil War fought in Maryland. Visit www.dnr.state.md.us/publiclands/ western/gathland.asp for more information.

WASHINGTON COUNTY RURAL HERITAGE MUSEUM

Depicting the heritage of local farming life, this museum displays antique farm equipment, an authentic turn-of-the century country store, and model rooms of a typical 19th century farmhouse as well as a gift shop. The museum is open Saturdays & Sundays 1–4 p.m., April through October, except holidays. Groups are by appointment. There is no fee. in the Colonial Militia, expanded rapidly before becoming the seat of the new county and

soon developed into the hub of commerce for the valley.

After the opening of the National Road in 1822, a surfaces highway extending inland to the Ohio Valley, Hagerstown and the towns along the turnpike grew and prospered, providing services to travelers and shipping points for local products. Following the Civil War, the city flourished as a railroad junction and manufacturing center. By the turn of the century, a wide range of products from automobiles to beer to bicycles were being shipped to all parts of the country.

Today, though the products have changed with the times, the manufacturing tradition lives on.

There's no place in Maryland that's better for bicycling than Washington County. Whether you are a leisure cyclist seeking a near wilderness experience, a day rider looking for new roads and places to explore, or a tourist in search of a good weekend trip, Washington County has something for you. Its historic towns, pleasant countryside, and miles of quiet back roads invite you to simply relax and enjoy yourself.

Located in scenic Western Maryland, Hagerstown and Washington County is one of the top tour destinations in the Quad-State region. Situated at the crossroads of Interstates 70 and 81, Hagerstown is about one hour from both Baltimore and Washington, DC, by car.

ABOUT THE MAP

There are hundreds of miles of paved roads in Washington County, almost all excellent for bicycling. This map was developed to help you plan an infinite variety of bicycle trips along the best of these roads.

There is a great deal of useful information on the map. Major creeks are shown as are all towns. The roads along the bicycle routes and all intersecting roads are shown and labeled.

Highlighted information includes eight suggested loop tours which are shown in color. The name and location of points of interest is also included.

The C&O Canal Towpath and the Western MD Rail Trail are well known biking routes in the area. Both are shown on the county map.

SERVICES

All that you need for your tour in Washington County is readily available in Hagerstown, and the towns and rural crossroads along the suggested bicycle routes. Restaurants and markets in the towns offer a variety of foods to keep you pedaling. If you want to spend several days in the area, you may choose to stay at one of the campgrounds in the county. Or, you might decide on more comfortable accommodations in Hagerstown, Williamsport, or Hancock.

Bicycle shops in Hagerstown, Hancock and Williamsport can help you with your bicycle needs should you have any problems. In case of emergency, call 911 to reach the police, fire department or ambulance service.

SAFETY TIPS

The bicycle is legally considered a vehicle in Maryland. Bicyclists have the full rights and responsibilities of roadway users and are subject to all regulations governing a vehicle. Follow the tips below to make sure of a safe trip along the roads of Washington County.

Always ride on the right. Obey all traffic signs and signals. Avoid night riding, especially in rural areas. When with a group, ride single file. Watch for sand, loose gravel, and wet leaves. Always wear a helmet.

TERRAIN

Washington County encompasses the slopes and valley floor of the Great Valley. The Maryland segment is called the Hagerstown Valley while south of the Potomac in West Virginia and Virginia is called the Shenandoah Valley. North of the Mason-Dixon line in Pennsylvania, it's known as the Cumberland Valley. From the gentle rises in the central valley around Hagerstown to the steeper hills of the western and eastern slopes, the terrain can be generally classified as rolling.

CLIMATE

Termed "temperate," the climate of Washington County is good for bicycling from early spring to late fall. The transition seasons are particularly good for bicycling with cool morning temperatures and sunny days. Summer is pleasant although July tends to be the hottest month. Even then, bicycling early in the day is comfortable. The average annual rainfall is about 39 inches with heaviest rainfall occurring during May and June.

A VIEW OF THE VALLEY

Starts at: Washington County Regional Park – 21 Miles **Direction:** Clockwise

Description: One big climb, then rolling

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This ride climbs part-way up South Mountain to provide a spectacular view of the Hagerstown valley with its orchards and farms.

SOUTH MOUNTAIN – SHARPSBURG TOUR

Starts at: Shafer Memorial Park – 33 Miles Direction of Travel: Clockwise Description: Hilly to rolling

This tour begins in the historic Town of Boonsboro, then heads south for a climb up South Mountain to the War Correspondents' Arch at Gathland State Park. You then travel back up the valley to the Town of Keedysville, where water is available in the park, then on to Sharpsburg and the Antietam National Battlefield, site of the bloodiest day of the Civil War. After leaving the battlefield, you will pass the University of Maryland Experimental Farm and the Washington County Agricultural Education Center and Rural Heritage Museum.

CAMP HARDING – FORT FREDERICK TOUR Starts at: Clear Spring Park – 30 Miles Direction of Travel: Counter clockwise

Description: Hilly, very rural

Camp Harding County Park is the site used by President Harding, Thomas Edison, Henry Ford and Harvey Firestone for camping and fishing in the 1920's. Fort Frederick State Park boasts the only remaining stone French & Indian War fort in the country, and is restored to that era. It features historical re-enactments on certain weekends. You will have a chance to rest your legs on part of the paved Western Maryland Rail Trail.

You will pass the Wilson Bridge Picnic Area, at the longest stone arch bridge in the county, and can stop at the Wilson Store, which is a typical country store and post office from a by-gone era.


